Despite the unspoken Arizona rule of secluding oneself indoors during the heat, the first thing Kismet Weiss did after relocating her family from Georgia in summer 2009 was to find a church community.

HTLC stood out with a summer program called "Wacky Wednesdays" where folks attended sessions on a range of topics.

"It could be a music session, or one about crafting or needlework," she said. "We decided to show up to one, and that's where we met Pastor

Scott Thompson. He was teaching a class on changing tires."

It turned out to be a fun experience, and one that was engaging enough to keep her and her family showing up for more church functions. "I've always been heavily involved in every church I've been a part of," Kismet says.

She currently serves on council, coordinates Christmas and Easter programs, co-manages the Borderlands Produce Rescue events, sings in the choir and praise band, plays handbells, and more.

"My mom is a musician, so we could sing since we could talk," Kismet recounts. "She would rope us into church stuff all the time, including singing and playing in nursing homes around town."

Family, music, and traditions make Kismet excited, especially her weekly tradition of hosting family dinners at her house on Sunday nights.
