Since it's inception in 2012, Holy Trinity's Homeless Advocacy Team (HAT) ministry has served and hosted thousands of people experiencing homelessness.

The HAT ministry acts as a part of Interfaith Chandler's Homeless Emergency Lodging Program (I-HELP), which provides over 6,700 emergency shelter nights to homeless adults. Nearly 50% of clients are

supported to employment and over 30% to housing.

Outside organizations often partner with HAT to assist in serving food and cleaning up. The Kiwanis Club spent a Thurs-

day night in August joining our regular HAT ministry members.

When asked why she participates

in the Kiwanis Club, Diane Schal said, "I feel I need to give back because I have been so blessed with everything I've gotten in my life."

"These people are wonderful," said Schal, referring to the guests.

"They've hit hard times and I need to give back to them."
